

«There they discovered thirty or forty windmills that can be found in that field...»


For many specialists in Cervantes and historians, the great writer was inspired by that spot, the Sierra de los Molinos in Campo de Criptana, when he wrote the famous adventure that begins chapter VIII of the first volume of Don Quixote. In the "Relaciones" of Felipe II, in 1575, it was said that in Campo de Criptana «there were many windmills» and in the property register commissioned by the Marquis de la Ensenada in the middle of the eighteenth century, it is found that at that time, there were no less than 34 windmills in Campo de Criptana.

Campo de Criptana is the Land of Giants

Home to giants in the world of music such as Don Manuel Angulo, Don Ángel Arteaga or the well known composer Don Luis Cobos.

Home to other giants in the world of the performing arts such as Don Enrique Alarcón or the universal Sara Montiel of the silver screen, Don Domingo Miras, national theatre prize-winner or the founder of the Tirso de Molina Company, Manuel Manzaneque. Home to literary giants such as Valentín Arteaga, José González Lara, Raimundo Escribano, Ignacio Escribano and Francisco López-Casero Olmedo.

Home to great painters such as Pepe Díaz, Valbuena, Antequera and Morales.



of FIESTAS...

The local fiestas dedicated to the Stma. Virgen de Criptana and the Stmo. Cristo de Villajos should be highlighted.

The former is celebrated on Easter Monday with its pilgrimage to the hill where the hermitage stands and the second is at the end of August with a full agenda of cultural, sporting, ludic and religious activities in honour of the Patron, the Holy Christ of Villajos.

On the other hand, the Carnival, celebrated during the three days before Ash Wednesday is also worth a mention with its parades of floats and local groups

Easter in Campo de Criptana is deeply rooted in popular culture. It is one of the most spectacular of the surrounding area due to great local participation and the expressive content of its processional images.

The May festivities, (Los Mayos) break the silence of the nights of May with the sound of guitars and other string instruments and the thrill of the serenade which still keeps local girls awake as it did in the past.

Being in Campo de Criptana allows us to relive our past and, despite the changes, learn about the work of the skilled craftsmen who, with their effort and dedication have created authentic objects linked to the traditional lifestyles of the village such as farming tools, wrought iron, rope stools, baskets, lace, crochet, antiques etc.



of FLAVOURS...

Good food and wine are to be found in Campo de Criptana. Traditional Manchegan cuisine predominates: gachas con tropezones (a savoury dish with a porridge-like consistency with lumps of pork and chorizo), migas de pastor (small pieces of fried bread with pork, chorizo and peppers), ajo tomate (garlic and tomato stew), cordero a la caldereta (lamb stew), pisto manchego (pepper and tomato stew), sopas de ajo (garlic soup), pipirrana (cold tomato and fish stew). In addition to local gastronomy, in Campo de Criptana other products such as Manchego cheese, hand made cakes and confectionary and wine can be tasted and aquired. Wine is the fruit of this land, the source of wealth and the motor of development, the tradition being passed down from father to son and adapted to modern technology. Its colours, bouquet and flavour make it our best

ambassador to the rest of the world.

- 1 Wind mills Ten restored windmills and three in ruins are still standing. Sardinero, Infante and Burleta are the oldest, having
- been constructed in the sixteenth century. They have been declared as Property of Cultural Interest and conserve their original structures and mechanisms.

 4 El Pósito Real Sixteenth century building with additions from the eighteenth century. It was the headquarters of an agricultural
- eighteenth century. It was the headquarters of an agricultural bank controlled by the local council that lent grain to farmers in times of shortage as an advance on the following year. At the moment it houses the municipal museum where exhibitions and other activities are held.

 5 Parish Church Inaugurated in 1958, it was built on the ruins of an eclectic church from the sixteenth century that was destroyed

during the Civil War.

7 Veracruz Hermitage Dating back to the sixteenth century, it is the headquarters of one of the most traditional guilds of the village. The only remaining original elements are the interior roofing with wooden beams, the arched facade and the typically rennaissance decoration.
8 St Ana's Hermitage It was built during the second half of the

9 Hermitage of the Mother of God Baroque style. A single nave with a shafted dome and cupola.
10 St Christopher's Hermitage Built at the beginning of the eighteenth century, it is of a baroque style with the dome shaped

- 10 St Christopher's Hermitage Built at the beginning of the eighteenth century, it is of a baroque style with the dome shaped like a sea shell.
 11 St Isidore's Hermitage A kilometre from the Sierra de los Molinos, it was built after the Civil War.
- 12 Hermitage of the Christ of Villajos A few kilometres along the road to Miguel Esteban, this XVIII century baroque style church can be found. Inside, an image of the Patron Christ is kept and a carving of the Virgen, whose origin dates back to the XIII century, appeared. This figure is presently exhibited in the Church of the Assumption of Our Lady.
- 13 Hermitage of the Virgin of Criptana It can be found at the top of a hill situated about 2 km to the East of the village on the N-420 road. It is the home of the image of the Virgin of Criptana, patron saint of the village and dates back to the sixteenth century.
